

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## Message from the Board Chair

Our theme this year is preparing leaders of future generations and reaching for the stars. Many young people in our community are capable of leadership but who can predict what skills will be needed in the future. This year we lost a great leader, Edith Chamberlayne, the original founder of the SOS. Fifty-five years ago Edith was a teacher who saw children coming to school inadequately clothed and fed. She was determined to do something about this. She and two friends, with a contribution of \$25 each, formed a non-profit society, SOS. It occurred to me as I was planning my remarks for her memorial service that Edith did more than start an organization. Through SOS, she created the opportunity for us to experience the meaning of community. As a leader she gave us three things: the precedent for the idea that others' struggles were everyone's responsibility; evidence that taking

small actions can have significant effects; and, a way of being in the community, a set of practices. While Edith had a forceful and dynamic personality, it all started with the com-



passion and the love she had for her students. So when we think about the skills needed for the future it is certain that the "soft skills" of compassion and empathy will still be essential to achieve true community. It may be enough preparation if future generations can embrace and embody a quote from the great anthropologist Margaret Mead who said: "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world, indeed it is the only thing that ever has." dom she bestowed upon us. In my 30 years with SOS, I've also seen a lot of change, particularly once the pandemic struck. But one positive repercussion is



our increased resiliency. As we look to our future, we revel in the knowledge that whatever comes our way, together with our supporters, we can face it with our heads held high. We had 62 volunteers help out in the Thrift Shop this year, with an average of 44 per month. We could not have operated without them!

### PICK-UPS

We resumed donation pick-ups in August, after being on hold due to the pandemic. From August until March we went to 166 homes.



## What Can I Do to Support Kids?

As she lay on her couch watching the news on TV and suffering from the flu, Olinda Elasser had an epiphany.

With so much disheartening news about young people killing others, suffering and dying, she wondered where we had failed as a society. She remembered back to when she volunteered to help set up a drug awareness seminar for youth. She thought it would be for high school students, but she found out from the man hosting the event that it was targeted to younger children.

"He told me that the younger you can get to children who are having problems in life, those problems can be solved quicker and easier than later in their life," she explained. Olinda surmised that we need more supports in our schools, and more free community programs for children and youth. And that's when it hit her.

"We have such programs right here with SOS!" Olinda said at that moment, she made a commitment to support SOS programs for children and youth.

She attends the SOS Seniors Connecting program and said she knows that SOS is a well run organization and does an excellent job of programming.



Olinda said food is an important part of children feeling secure, and she likes that SOS supports families in this way. Besides mentoring the kids and offering fun activities and a listening ear, SOS also provides food in programming. Families can also access the SOS Emergency Assistance program if they need help putting food in the cupboards.

Olinda said she used to send donations to international locations, but she feels it's important to support local children and youth and she hopes seniors agree. "Some of them may not be able to afford it, but if they can, let's step up here and if you can, make donations to children's programs instead of just thinking about ourselves," she said. "Which sometimes as seniors, we do."

### Time in Comfort for Tots & Caregivers (TIC TAC)

A welcoming and nurturing environment for children to play and build social and emotional skills while parents and caregivers take a much-needed break.

"Having social interactions with other parents, and to actually have adult-talk and not kid-talk, with everything that's going on, it's just amazing that we can come here and do this."

### Kids Movement: Play, Express & Grow

Fun activities inspire confidence, friendships and a healthy self-image. Staff and volunteers provide mentorship and support. SOS provides transportation to the program from all District 69 Elementary Schools.

"I can't say enough! It has presented so many enriching and diverse opportunities and experiences. As a single working mom, I am so incredibly grateful."

### **Family Night**

Families get to spend quality time together while SOS serves a meal and cleans up afterwards. We provide the entertainment such as arts, crafts, games and music.

### **School Night Out**

A safe place for youth in grades 7-8 to express themselves, go on outings and connect with their peers. Youth play games and music, and create art and crafts. Staff and volunteers provide mentorship.

SOS really brings the community together in my opinion."

### **Youth Open Space**

A positive place for teens in grades 9-12 to connect with others, eat tasty food, play music, create art and receive support from staff.

"It makes kids who don't really have anywhere to go after school have a place to form memories and bonds with others, make new friends, have fun, do activities, go places."

### **GradWear**

Helps local grads look and feel their best for graduation ceremonies, without all the costs. The program provides new and gently used dresses, gowns, tuxes and suits, plus shoes and accessories, for \$5.

### **After School Tutoring Program**

After school professional, one-on-one tutoring services assist students in grades 6-12 in Math and English at no cost.

Light snacks are provided to students.

"This program is consistent and dependable and the fact that it is free is incredible. Help with studying has made a big difference in my test scores."

### **Caring for Community at Christmas**

Provides special gifts to local children and youth in low-income families. Adults receive grocery store gift cards. Christmas stockings are assembled by local Newcomers' Clubs and delivered by SOS volunteers to seniors who are isolated. "I am literally floored by the generosity of this community. I am so grateful that you all made Christmas possible for my kids. The biggest thank you to all the staff and volunteers. I left with tears in my eyes and a happy heart."

Adults assisted: 1,021 Children and youth who received gifts: 1,041



### **Recreation Assistance for Children & Youth**

Low income families receive funds to help register children and youth in recreational activities and summer camps that they would otherwise be unable to afford. The program also assists with applying for provincial sports grants. "I can't thank you enough for making this opportunity possible for my girls to play a sport they love, join activities, and go to summer camp. They've both been asking for years, but it was never financially possible."

### **Counselling Referral**

Provides referrals for short-term counselling to low-income adults, individuals, and couples. Professional counsellors help residents work through challenges and develop strategies to cope, and improve their quality of life.

"Your incredible services, your prompt responses and professional credentials saved my family. Thank you from the bottom of my heart, you are a dream team."

Total referrals: 115



### **Emergency Assistance & Advocacy**

Provides help in cases of hardship with essentials like food, medicine, clothing and household items. Advocacy assistance helps residents overcome financial obstacles, and promotes self-sufficiency.

"I could either eat or pay rent. I didn't have anyone to ask. I went to SOS and was treated with respect. I left there with my chin up and a smile on my face."

### **Homeless Prevention Program**

Assists with housing and supports for a targeted group of residents who are homeless or at immediate risk of homelessness. Eligible residents receive rental subsidies, funded by the BC Government.

### **Income Tax**

Provides assistance for low-income residents to file their taxes at no cost. Working with the Revenue Canada Community Volunteer Income Tax Program, SOS volunteers receive training and file tax returns electronically. "I have appreciated all the help I was given with my tax returns from everyone. I have put away most of the money I received for my only son's wedding." **Total participants**: 706 **Total tax returns filed**: 737



### **Medical Appointment Transportation Service**

Safe and friendly transportation to and from medical appointments within District 69 by SOS Volunteers. This program restarted in March 2023. "Thank you for arranging a drive for a medical appointment. It is comforting to know that a complete stranger will take the time to do this, out of the goodness of their heart." Number of drives: 20 Clients: 23 Kilometers driven: 413



### Meals On Wheels

This program helps residents maintain health and independence by delivering hot, nutritious meals, three times a week. The food is prepared at Arrowsmith Lodge and delivered by SOS volunteers.

"I was having trouble getting enough nutrients in my diet. Now, I don't have to worry about that. The soups are excellent, and I like that the food is well balanced."

#### Oceanside Better at Home

Provides a range of non-medical support services to help seniors aged 65+ remain in their own homes. The program is administered by SOS in partnership with the United Way British Columbia and funded by the Government of BC. "I used to drive around Parksville and Qualicum. But then my life changed altogether. Now, I look forward to my visits, and I rely on this program."

### **Seniors Advocacy Services**

Assists seniors in finding supports and solutions through SOS programs and other resources. The program provides emergency financial aid for things like food and medicine, helps seniors fill out government forms, provides advocacy and helps seniors work through various concerns.

Client appointments: 1,020 Vouchers issued for emergencies: 486




### **Seniors Connecting**








SOS was started in 1968 by three local women around a kitchen table. They were concerned the needs of local school children were going unmet and that seniors were going without basic necessities. They gathered their friends and neighbours to volunteer and fill the gaps in the community. Those three women were Edith Chamberlayne, Pauline Touzeau and Betty Marocchi. Pauline and Betty passed away many years ago, and we lost Edith in 2022 at the age of 96.

### This excerpt is from Edith's Eulogy written by SOS Board Chair, Jennifer Mullett:

"Edith did more than establish an organization – she created a community. A community that comes out by the thousands at Christmas to rally around the SOS Christmas program, a community where businesses like Tigh-Na-Mara and others devote time, money and staff to their community. With the establishment of SOS, she created a precedent for the idea that the troubles experienced by some members of our community are the responsibility of all of us and we can take action that has significant effects."




### **55th Anniversary Legacy Celebrations**
