I think his name was Garth, but I'm not totally sure as he was slurring his words a bit. He was there with all his worldly goods, waiting patiently. I asked him what he knew about SOS, but it was pretty clear that he wasn't looking for a conversation with a complete stranger. Instead he told me that he really needed "help" and that someone had told him that he could find that help here. I told him that I was also looking for help, but that my needs weren't that urgent so I could wait.

Someone unlocked the door and Garth hustled inside. I thought I would wait a while so that he wouldn't feel uncomfortable to have someone else around while he checked in with our front-line staff.

By the time I got up the stairs, Garth was seated in a chair and one of our wonderful staff was chatting with him. I don't know what was being said, but it looked like he was getting the help he thought he needed.

After I left the building I got to thinking that I had just witnessed one of the small things that makes SOS great. Look, I understand that there are many instances where big things change the world — just witness what Bill Gates is doing to eradicate malaria — but I honestly believe that great good can come from many small things, like how Garth was treated like a human being when he visited SOS. Even if we can't solve all his problems,



we can give some help when he really needs it, and probably give him some comfort that he doesn't get in his hard life on the streets.

We wouldn't be able to help Garth, or countless other people in Oceanside, without some of the small things that you do — donating to our Thrift Shop or shopping there, volunteering or supporting our programs.

So, on behalf of Garth (and I really hope that was his name now we have all met him), thanks for everything you do for us.

It was an even busier day than usual at SOS Thrift Shop on September 21 as the social enterprise celebrated 20 years at 188 Hirst Avenue and 55 years in the community.

"We're very proud of what the Thrift Shop has been able to accomplish and we're so grateful for the community support," said Thrift Shop Manager, Paulette Harcourt. Customers enjoyed food and refreshments, live '60s themed music by Bob & CJ, and everyone had a chance to spin the wheel for discounts. SOS Thrift Shop has 37 staff members and an average of 44 volunteers per month. It is the main funder of all SOS's programs and services. Serving Meals On Wheels for 50 years

Early on, SOS founding members recognized there were residents who had trouble maintaining a healthy diet, so they started Meals On Wheels. From SOS's book, *Celebrating a Caring Community*, founding member and SOS President Pauline Touzeau had this to say after the first delivery in 1973:

"Many months of planning by Mrs. Margaret Rush and her committee, with many obstacles to overcome, resulted in hot meals being delivered to twenty-one recipients by six cars of volunteers on the first day."

Last year, the Meals On Wheels program provided 19,604 meals to an average of 115 clients each month.

Expanding our reach and assistance

For years, SOS has been providing programs for children, youth, families and seniors that promote healthy social connections and combat isolation. In early 2023, a pilot project began to engage the missing middle age group, and it was named SOS XYZ Generations.

"We started this group to connect with local adults in the 25 to 55 age range, and provide something fun for them to do while helping to expand their social network," said Lissa Alexander, SOS Communications Manager. "It's also a great way to expand our reach, share information about SOS, and help people feel more connected to our community."

So far the group has hosted two events, a Throwback Thursday Game Night, and a Foraging Tour in Coombs. Plans are underway for quarterly events that will take place at SOS and around the community.

SOS also expanded its Family

"This new program aims to facilitate new relationships with our older and younger generations," said SOS Child, Youth & Family Programs Manager, Alice Tulia. "We hope these new connections enrich both their lives."
