Thrift Shop

Transforming Lives Together

Gale worked hard her whole life, so when she found herself in her seventies without enough money to live on, she began feeling hopeless (her name has been changed to protect her identity).

"Life got going and I was going to buy [a house] but that didn't happen and now that's really impossible," she said. "And now the rents are nowhere near where they were five or six years ago so there's no way I can afford them." After receiving some inheritance from her parents, her partner left with every dime she had. She went back to work but got very sick, and said her body just shut down. She had nowhere left to turn when she called SOS.

The SOS Seniors' Advocacy Services Coordinator helped Gale access government benefits that she was unaware she was eligible for, including Employment Insurance, additional pension funds, and she received back-payments from the federal government. SOS also helped Gale apply for low-income housing, she's been accepted and is now on the waiting list. Gale was relieved



with the support she received from SOS.

"I could breathe again," Gale said. "Some people ask me, why didn't you do this and why didn't you do that on your own, but if you don't know the right questions to ask, then how do you know to ask it?"

This is not an isolated story. In less than a year, SOS has been able to help recover more than \$120,000 in government benefits for local seniors. The SOS Impact Campaign continues to raise funds to provide supports to help seniors age in place, stay connected with others, and provide financial support during times of emergency. Time in Comfort for Tots & Caregivers (TICTAC)

A welcoming and nurturing environment for children to play and build social and emotional skills while parents and caregivers take a much-needed break.

"TICTAC has been so wonderful for our family. The boys love it and look forward to it every week. I love the break for myself to talk to other moms and not feel so alone with parenting struggles."

Intergenerational Family Night

Families get to spend quality time together while SOS serves dinner and cleans up afterwards. SOS provides the entertainment such as arts, crafts, games and music. We welcome seniors into the group to engage with families. "It's so nice to meet other families and to see the kids play together. The dinner is wonderful and it saves me cooking for once. Thank you."

School Night Out

A safe place for youth in grades 7-8 to express themselves, go on outings and connect with their peers. Youth play games and music, and create art and crafts. Staff and volunteers provide mentorship.

"I really like that I have gone on field trips I didn't know existed like archery

and I met my best friend there." **Total participants:** Parksville: 50 Qualicum: 27



Youth Open Space

A positive place for teens in grades 9-12 to connect with others, eat tasty food, play music, create art and receive support from staff.

"My teenagers love Youth Open Space. For immigrants like us and not familiar with the people and place, YOS helps them meet new friends and become comfortable here. Plus they enjoy the activities and food, especially the field trips."

GradWear

Helps local grads look and feel their best for graduation ceremonies, without all the costs. Provides new and gently used outfits, plus shoes and accessories, for \$5. A local youth who had moved to Sweden came back for prom and was able to attend because of this program. Not only did the suit fit perfectly, he was so happy with it, he wore it home from his GradWear appointment.

After School Tutoring Program

After school professional, one-on-one tutoring services assist students in grades 6-12 in Math and English at no cost. Light snacks are provided. "My daughter's marks in Math are significantly better. This goes a long way in boosting her confidence, and creates a more positive experience at school. Math used to be her least favourite subject. It's not anymore."

Caring for Community at Christmas

Provides special gifts to local children and youth in low-income families. Adults receive grocery store gift cards. Christmas stockings are assembled by local Newcomers' Clubs and delivered by SOS volunteers to seniors who are isolated. "My little boy got a bike. I thought maybe we would get a couple books, or some jammies. I would never have been able to provide a bike for him. He's going to be able to ride that for a few years to come."

Recreation Assistance for Children & Youth

Low income families receive funds to help register children and youth in recreational activities and summer camps that they would otherwise be unable to afford. The program also assists with applying for provincial sports grants.

"It has helped my son make new friends, learn new skills, and be an active part of our community. I am so very thankful for this program that betters our children's lives."

Counselling Referral

Provides referrals for short-term counselling to low-income individuals, and couples. Professional counsellors help residents work through challenges and develop strategies to cope, and improve their quality of life.

"I think about so many people who never come forward to talk to a professional to help and heal. I am very grateful for the strength of empowerment I now have."

Emergency Assistance & Advocacy

Provides help in cases of hardship with essentials like food, medicine, clothing and household items. Advocacy assistance helps residents overcome financial obstacles, and promotes self-sufficiency.

Homeless Prevention Program

Assists with housing and supports for a targeted group of residents who are homeless or at immediate risk of homelessness. Eligible residents receive rental subsidies, funded by the BC Government.

They check in with me regularly to see how I am. It's just been great."

Income Tax

Provides assistance for low-income residents to file their taxes at no cost. SOS volunteers receive CRA training and file tax returns electronically. "That program was extremely helpful because when you don't make enough money to pay someone to do your taxes, and you don't know how to do them yourself, you can't get them done."

Medical Appointment Transportation Service

Safe and friendly transportation to and from medical appointments within District 69 by SOS Volunteers.

Meals On Wheels

This program helps residents maintain health and independence by delivering hot, nutritious meals, three times a week. The food is prepared at Arrowsmith Lodge and delivered by SOS volunteers.

Oceanside Better at Home

Provides a range of non-medical support services to help seniors aged 65+ remain in their own homes. The program is administered by SOS in partnership with the United Way British Columbia and funded by the Government of BC.

Ellen and Brian Freestone attribute the SOS Meals On Wheels program with bringing them closer together.

Through shared smiles, Ellen says, "Driving together is a great way to further develop those important marital qualities such as patience, self-control, and graciousness!" The couple has volunteered in the SOS Meals On Wheels program (MOW) for over

two years. The meals are prepared by professional staff at Arrowsmith Lodge and the menu is created under the guidance of a certified dietitian. SOS subsidizes the meal cost keeping it affordable for clients, and SOS volunteers deliver the meals three days a week. The program is available to local residents who need help maintaining a healthy diet.

The Freestones agree, "MOW is more than just a food delivery service; it also brings a break, a conversation, and some cheer to those who may often be quite isolated. And it serves as an informal wellness check."

Brian and Ellen are now both retired and have flexible schedules, and believe MOW is



"a good way to volunteer together and give back to the community." Over the years, the couple has become familiar with their beloved route and says, "We have worked out our partnership and really enjoy our time together meeting with our SOS clients."

Ellen and Brian have made friends with fellow volunteers and MOW clients. "One of the

things that we see over and over again is how people can stay in their homes longer because of a community of neighbours and organizations like SOS who are looking out for them," says Ellen. SOS is actively recruiting volunteers, to learn more








enjoyed entertainment by Tom Jackson, a renowned Canadian actor, musician, activist, and Companion of the Order of Canada. One lucky winner won a raffle prize of brunch for two with Tom and Alison Jackson at Cedar's Restaurant. Susanna said it was wonderful to see the community engage in the online auction and raffle, and attend and enjoy the event.
